
Holocaust Memorial Day Event




LECTURE



Dr Maurna Crozier Memorial Lecture Religion, Nationalism and Political Violence

With Professor Richard English

Much popular assumption presents religion and nationalism as the twin causes behind contemporary political violence. Is it true that religious belief and practice, and nationalist commitment and solidarity, also offer some of the best ways of limiting and constraining our tendency towards political violence and conflict?

Richard English is Distinguished Professorial Fellow in the Senator George J. Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security, and Justice at Queen's University Belfast. Dr Crozier, a former President of the Linen Hall Library, was Director of the Cultural Diversity Programme at the Community Relations Council and was a policy adviser with a lifelong commitment to improving cultural as well as community life in Northern Ireland.

Highland Bagpipers of the First World War

Ian Burrows presents a lecture and recital on the Highland Bagpipers of the First World War. Two-and-a-half thousand pipers served in the Great War; men from Scotland, Ireland, Canada, Australia and New Zealand. They were there to entertain the troops, lead them in the long marches that they had to endure, lift their spirits, rouse the men into battle, and lament the fallen. Over 500 pipers were killed and 600 were wounded. Two pipers were awarded the Victoria Cross for their bravery and many other medals were presented to these courageous men. Part of the Gradam Ceoil fringe festival.

In the words of Seamus Heaney, "*He was a great Ulsterman and a great Irishman, a man of rare energy, one of the transformers in Irish life. This landmark documentary examines the life and legacy of David Hammond - broadcaster, folk-singer and artist. 


