The selected textiles have been chosen to sit in conversation with the archives present in the Angélica Pérez Germain Documentation Center of the National Museum of Fine Arts of Chile (CEDOC). The objective of the exhibit is to interrogate the museum archive from a decolonial perspective by creating a dialogue between the imaginaries of the memories present in the Conflict Textiles and the collection of the Museo Nacional de Bellas Artes. The exhibition is presented within the framework of the commemoration of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the coup d'état in Chile.
